Corpus Christi

1st Reading: Like Melchizedek, a high priest of the Old Testament, we bring bread and wine to the altar, giving thanks for our blessings. Christ, our high priest, transforms these gifts into his own body, given for the life of the world.

2nd Reading: This is one of the earliest accounts of the Mass, written by St Paul in the 50sAD. Our Mass keeps alive the memory (*anamnesis*) of Christ.

Gospel: One of the ten stories of meals in the Gospel of Luke that resemble the Mass: people gather around the Lord to share some food. They support one another and have leftovers to share with the wider world. *May the body of Christ which we receive at Mass sustain us and yield a harvest of good works.*

- *The 11.30am Mass will include a children's Liturgy of the Word*
- *To mark the feast of Corpus Christi an hour of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament will begin at 7.00pm in Killavullen Church concluding with Benediction at 8.00pm.*

Tom Barry Memorial at Annakisha: Our thanks to all who attended and assisted at last Sunday afternoon's event to mark the renovation of the monument. A special thanks to all who prepared and served the refreshments, at the interval of the local history talks, which were much appreciated. The question of the exact location of Tom Barry's burial seems to be resolved by the funeral notice which appeared in the *Cork Examiner* of May, 12, 1904. His funeral had taken place the previous day. The account states: "The funeral started from the (Killavullen) church shortly after two, and the internment took place at the Annakissy burial ground. By special permission of the parish priest, the remains were interred in the plot in front of the Annakissy Church, and this, it is understood, was done in accordance with the expressed wish of the deceased. The funeral was undoubtedly the largest seen in the district for many years, and when those present assembled around the grave as the last rites were being solemnised, there were few who were not given to the melting mood."

Next Friday (June 24) is the Feastday of the Sacred Heart. Devotion to the Sacred Heart is marked in our churches by the large picture in the reredos at Annakisha and, at Killavullen, by a statue as well as the stained glass window at the top left of the Church. The window also contains the image of St Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-1690), receiving the revelation as she prayed in her convent chapel at Paray-le-Monial in France. The image of the sacred heart reminds us of Christ's love for us, especially when we face challenging times. It is traditional to display an image of the Sacred Heart at home, as a reminder of that love and a sign of Christ's blessing on the family.
